### **Process**


Include the steps of the gospel throughout the lesson; so while student attention is fresh, the real lesson is being planted.

Begin with prayer.



*Solutions to our problems and provisions for our needs are found in the most unexpected places. God wants us to know He has provided for our computing needs in more ways than we can count.*

Our computer with its programs has all kinds of ways to help you get your tasks done. If you were typing a paragraph such as the one you’re now reading, you could click on a menu item at the top of your computer screen that says “Help” to get more information on how to indent your paragraph or change it in some way. If your word processor program has icons (little picture buttons) on the screen, you could simply move the mouse pointer over the top of one of these and a few words would appear that explain the purpose of that button.



Every day people around us have important path ideas and suggestions that can give us more help than we can imagine. Here are some of my favorites:

1. *The pictures, examples, metaphors, funny stories, charts, and graphs you add to your presentation or project MUST make things clearer to YOUR audience; if not, leave them out.* I learned this from my eighty-three-year-old father-in-law who hates computers with a vengeance.
2. *When planning a presentation or project on a computer, describe in a clear simple sentence where you want to land, before anything else. You need a goal.* I learned this from my pastor who started learning and using computers about thirty years later than I did.
3. *Know your audience, individually if possible, before you plan your presentation or project. Some will surprise you by how little they know about computers.* I learned this just before teaching a class; as I asked a student to turn on all the computers, I found that he didn't know how.
4. But the most wonderful surprise of help that I have found, comes from God's own inspired Word. One of the best-kept secrets is that II Timothy 3:16 and 17 mean exactly what they say... "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works." Doesn't ALL mean everything? So... unless God doesn't know what the word ALL means, I have the assurance that He and His Word have already set down MUST-HAVE guidelines for using my computer at church, home, school, and work.

See if you can discover in your Bible more computing principles to add to the list I've found. Expect God to honor His promises to help you as you dig for these. Here are a few to start your list:

5. *Break up large projects into small logical projects we'll call "modules".*
6. *Make a short simple statement of the goal for each module.*
7. *If others are involved, identify each individual with his or her respective module.*
8. *Expect and identify possible hurdles and opposition, and plan for these in advance.*
9. *If others are involved, establish good communication between team workers.*
10. What computing lesson is taught in *Proverbs 6:6-11* and *18:9*?

***This is tough!!***.. trying to select **just one** of the many accounts in God's Word which shows His provision for us. This story about Elijah you could title, Saved by Buzzards.

God's Word in 1 Kings 17:3 says, "*Get thee hence, and turn thee eastward, and hide thyself by the brook Cherith, that is before Jordan.*" Oh, that'll be great! He's going camping! He's going backpacking! No, he doesn't get to take any food, cooking utensils or canteen. This doesn't sound so good.

Verse 4 says: "*And it shall be, that thou shalt drink of the brook; and I have commanded the ravens to feed thee there.*" Is this a familiar story? You might be surprised to learn that the raven is the largest bird of the crow



family. It can have a wingspan of up to 56 inches. That's almost the distance from tip to tip of a man's fingers as he spreads his arms out straight. What's more interesting is that ravens eat dead animals. They're buzzards!! Isn't that neat? God's man stands before an evil king and says what he is supposed to say, and then God sends buzzards to feed **him**. Wow! !

Then God's word says: "*So he went and did according unto the word of the LORD: for he went and dwelt by the brook Cherith, that is before Jordan. And the ravens brought him bread and flesh in the morning, and bread and flesh in the evening; and he drank of the brook.*"

I don't think ravens make pizza deliveries nowadays. But if that's what God wanted, guess what? Those things happened because Elijah obeyed God... even when he didn't understand everything about it. That's called FAITH. God loves to provide for those who love Him...in **HIS OWN WAY**. God wants us to trust Him in ALL the things we do.

God's own Word says, "*But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him.*" I Cor. 2:9. ☩


**And** Brandi won more than first place in the hearts of her pastor, **and** of the older people in her church, **and** of her Lord, I'm sure. ☺

## **Computer Help in Weird Places - Friends Fun**

[ Theme: Watch everywhere for helpful ideas for your computing. ]

The following rainy day game will help to be imaginative in looking for ideas to help you be a better computer user.

With mom's permission place several chairs in a staggered arrangement. With a few friends in teams or otherwise, blindfold one person at a time and hands in pockets, see if they can walk through a prearranged path around the chairs without bumping them. Soon they'll want you to do the same. Since the rules didn't say you couldn't, take a long piece of clothes line rope and lay it on the floor following the approved path. While standing next to the rope, have someone blindfold you. Next, kick your shoes off and then merely walk on the rope. The fun lesson to learn is that all sorts of things and events are around us to suggest better ways of doing our computering. You could also compare the Holy Spirit to the rope, in that He guides us through the darkness and confusion of this world and our needs.



***Change anything, and you're dead!!*** ... might be good advice as you look in mom's recipe box and notice she has individual recipes for different kinds of cake frosting and different kinds of cakes.
