

## Picture Partnering

The Principle to Learn	In God's Word
Partners are more than helpers.	I Samuel 18:1,3,4

This “help” lesson differs from others that deal with unexpected, spur-of-the-moment help.

### Process

Include the steps of the gospel throughout the lesson; so while student attention is fresh, the real lesson is being planted.

Pray first.

We all like pictures. They're easy to understand and to appreciate. They comfort and inspire us. They help us learn, even if we don't know the alphabet, or how to write.



We enjoy having partners, or helpers, or buddies. A second person makes the accomplishing of many tasks more fun, easier, and safer too.



Some years ago, computers became faster and powerful enough to make pictures and words all mixed together like you see on this page, or in a schoolbook. You'd then be able to put together, or *partner* a description of your model airplane meet, with a picture map of how to get to the race location.

When the computer mouse was invented, someone discovered that a computer command could be *partnered* with a tiny picture. These simple little pictures are called **icons**.



What a wonderful help this is for handicapped folks who are not able to type a whole word or sentence. Just click on a little command icon, and watch your computer do this or that. Now grandparents too can have fun with computers, even though their fingers aren't as flexible as yours. It looks as if *partnering* is often the best thing to do.

One of the most successful ways to “picture partner” is with other pictures. To create a picture on the computer screen – especially one that’s in color - requires a lot of computer memory. It also takes longer to display the picture on the screen. If the picture is being sent through telephone lines into your computer – say from the Internet – it really slows down the computer. The solution is to create a picture smaller than the original but larger than a tiny icon picture.

This is most often done on Internet web pages. This little picture is called a **thumbnail**. If you move the mouse pointer over the top of a thumbnail picture, the arrow turns into a pointing hand. You can then left click on the mouse to have the computer display the big picture. Get the picture? <grin> In the box below, list some of the partnerships you can think of:

One fascinating partnership found in the Bible is that of Jonathan and David. To say that these two helped each other would be an understatement. Jonathan was a prince, the son of King Saul. David was the one who killed Goliath, and who later would become king.

Their partnership is described in I Samuel 18:1,3,4.

*“And it came to pass, when he had made an end of speaking unto Saul, that the soul of Jonathan was knit with the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul. Then Jonathan and David made a covenant, because he loved him as his own soul. And Jonathan stripped himself of the robe that was upon him, and gave it to David, and his garments, even to his sword, and to his bow, and to his girdle.”*




Partners are helpers that have a desire for the same goals. Their hearts are “knit” together. This moves them to make a contract or a covenant or a promise to one another. In this case, Jonathan contributed what he could to the partnership by taking off his princely robe, sword, girdle, and bow and giving these to David, to be his own possessions. Other verses show that Jonathan also looked out for the safety of his partner, David.

When we choose someone to help us learn to use a computer, we need a person who has a heart that is open to God’s leading and protection. That one should have a commitment to the work being done, and share in supplying the things that are needed. A real partner who is more than a helper must look out for the safety of the other. Satan is always trying to destroy our efforts to serve God with our computers, and each of us needs a partner who will help us watch for this enemy of our souls.(end)

The girls learned the human heart is actually two pumps connected together. One pump sends blood to one part of the body, and the other part of the heart sucks it back. Janey saw that Sue was really getting into this partnership thing when she said, “Janey, do you realize we’re learning things quickly because this human body program has teamed up words AND pictures?”

Janey was glad her friend had come over. She was really warmed inside knowing they were good partners in learning about neat new stuff. 
## Letter Flip Fun With Friends page

Make your own letter flip puzzle with a friend working with you. Maybe use friends names. A great friend to have is Jesus Christ and then to learn why His death on the cross was so important.




Choose a simple graphics program your computer has and type in the letters of CHRIST or another friend you have. Choose a shape of letters that is just a bit unusual.





You must make sure you're moving



portions of your graphic around with the DRAW OPAQUE

feature UNCHECKED. Otherwise one letter will totally cover up another letter behind it. Take some of the letters and stretch, flip, rotate, and maybe even overlap some of the letters. Create a Bible verse backwards that you have to read in a mirror. Some preteen computer hotdogs will



notice some letter fonts that aren't letters but are pictures. They make their own picture scrambles. What can you do with your friend to use your computer or computer pictures to show them how much Jesus Cares for them and you do too?
